Jerry has been interviewed on Dateline and 20/20 as well as numerous podcasts discussing his involvement in noteworthy cases

Heather Glogolich started her law enforcement career in 2004. She is presently a Captain with the NJ Institute of Technology Police Department after transferring from Morris Township Police Department as a Patrol Lieutenant. In her present assignment, Captain Glogolich is a Patrol Division Commander with collateral duties that include overseeing the Field Training Program, Accreditation, Emergency Services Unit, Crime Analysis, and serving as the agency's Domestic Violence Liaison and LGBTQ+ Liaison. During the course of her career, she has been assigned to a multitude of diverse assignments including patrol, school resource officer, traffic safety officer, and has performed the role of field training officer. Additionally, she currently is the President of New Jersey Women in Law Enforcement (NJWLE).

Captain Glogolich holds Masters degrees in Homeland Security and Administrative Science and in May of 2023, she earned a doctorate in Higher Education with a Servant Leadership focus from Saint Elizabeth University. She is certified as a career coach for law enforcement, is an instructor for the NJ State Association of Chiefs of Police Command and Leadership Program, and owns her own business called Empowered Policing. In addition to her impressive resume filled with achievements and accolades, Heather Glogolich survived a harrowing domestic violence incident in 2008 at the hands of her ex-husband. Instead of allowing it to break her, she has turned her pain into a purpose by sharing her story as a survivor through speaking presentations and victim advocacy.




Resilience & Leadership Lessons from a Hero's Journey 2:30 PM-4:30 PM Josh Vadell (Ret.) ACPD DC Bill Mazur (Ret.) ACPD



Josh Vadell is a husband and father of three girls. He is a 10-year veteran of the Atlantic City Police Department where he served in the Operations Division. On September 3, 2016, while on duty, Josh was shot in the head and critically injured while he and his partner interrupted an armed robbery in progress. Since his near fatal incident, Josh has persevered through extensive physical and emotional therapy and numerous surgeries for injuries sustained during the shooting.

However, this is not where his story of resilience and survival begins. In his presentation, Josh shares riveting stories of personal trauma he endured as an adolescent and into early adulthood. These events, and the lessons gleaned, transcend the law enforcement profession, and serve as an inspiration to anyone regardless of occupation, race, gender, or socio-economic status. Sharing his experience has become an integral part of his recovery. His journey has demonstrated the power of love, gratitude, forgiveness, resilience, and the warrior spirit as key components to surviving trauma and the personal growth that can result from such events.

Josh and his wife Laura started a non-profit foundation called "The Josh Vadell Foundation". The foundation provides monetary and emotional support to families of officers critically injured in the line of duty as well as community members who have experienced significant trauma.



Bill Mazur is a 25-year law enforcement veteran and retired in 2017 at the rank of Deputy Chief of Police. Bill holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Stockton University and a Master's Degree in Human Resources Training and Development in the Police Graduate Studies Program from Seton Hall University. Bill is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, Session #256, and currently serves as a Master Instructor with the FBI National Academy Associates, in their Comprehensive

ence Program for law Enforcement. Additionally, Bill currently serves on the Wellness Committee for the NJ State Association of Chiefs of Police (NJSACOP) as an advisor.

Bill has worked in the behavioral healthcare field exclusively, as a Public Safety Liaison, to provide specialized treatment guidance for public safety personnel, first responders and their families who may find themselves in a personal crisis because of a mental health issue or substance use disorder.

DC Michael Rein (Ret.), The Healy+ Group

For more than 22 years, Michael J. Rein served as a trusted member of the Rutgers University Department of Public safety; retiring in 2022 as the Deputy Chief of University Police. The Rutgers University Police Department is comprised of more than 180 sworn and 340 non-sworn employees. In this role he was primarily responsible all professional

standards functions. More specifically, Mike supervised the Internal Affairs, CALEA Accreditation, 9-1-1 Communications, Department Training Functions as well as the University's compliance with the Clery Act. Mike exercised oversight, coordination and implemented systems and policies to ensure consistency in all campus safety and security functions across the Rutgers University system. Moreover, Mike provided direct and indirect supervision over the Chiefs of Police at each Rutgers University location.

Considered an expert in public safety regionalization and shared services, Mike oversaw & coordinated the integration of the University of Medicine & Dentistry of New Jersey's Police Department into the Rutgers Police Department & more general public safety activities associated with the integration of the universities. Mike has worked with neighboring jurisdictions to build successful partnerships and shared services agreements, which leveraged economies of scale to provide exceptional services, which exceed customer expectations. He was responsible for the coordination and management of the University Police Department's CALEA - Law Enforcement, CALEA - Communications, IACLEA and NJSACOP Accreditations since the initial self-assessment phases. In addition, he oversaw the deployment of all Public Safety Technologies (CCTV, Access Control & Alarm installations and monitoring) on the university's campuses, statewide. Mike served as an appointed member to the New Jersey Statewide Public Safety Communications Commission working to enhance 9-1-1 telephone and Interoperable Communications Systems in New Jersey as well as the Mental Health/Special Needs Statewide Steering Committee working to maximize the effectiveness of Law Enforcement response to those with disabilities or those in mental health crisis. He was previously also a CALEA assessor and assessment team leader and serves as an executive fellow with the Police Foundation. From 2020 - 22, Mike served as the President of the New Jersey Public Safety College and University Public Safety Association and previously as an executive board member of the New Jersey Public Safety Accreditation Coalition. He currently serves as an elected Fire District Commissioner in Central New Jersey as well as an Executive Fellow with the National Policing Institute (formerly the Police Foundation).

Mike is a regular instructor at area police academies in the areas of ethics, police use of force, risk mitigation; employee and administrative investigations and social media etiquette for public employees as well as an adjunct instructor with the Rutgers Center of Government Studies and School of Public Affairs and Administration (SPAA). Mike holds a Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice and a Master of Arts in Labor and Employee Relations from Rutgers University. He is a graduate of the West Point Command and Leadership Program (NJSACOP Command & Leadership Academy); Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar (FBI LEEDS); 10th session of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Executive Institute, and the 264th session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy in Quantico, Va. Mike is a certified Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and Certified Public Manager.

Murray began her career in municipal law enforcement as a civilian employee with the City of Richmond Police Department (Virginia). She graduated from the Virginia Commonwealth University Police Training Academy and began her career as a sworn police officer for the University of Richmond (UR) Police Department (Virginia). At UR, Murray progressed through the ranks from a night shift patrol officer to Operations Lieutenant (overseeing criminal investigations, crime prevention and patrol) over the span of a decade before becoming the Chief of Police at Davidson College in North Carolina. Most recently, Murray served as Chief of Police at Trinity Washington University (in Washington, D.C.).

As the Executive Director, Equity Compliance and Civil Rights Services for DSA, Murray builds on her 17-year career in law enforcement in which she became a nationally recognized expert in the field of best practice postsecondary institutional response to the sexual victimization of college women in the United States and in Canada. She is also a trained civil rights investigator and is well respected throughout the country for her ability to aid institutions in understating how to do best practice criminal and civil rights investigations concurrently. She is well known for her work in having provided support, advocacy and criminal investigative services for victims of sexual assault, stalking and intimate partner violence and is a sought-out speaker and investigator. She has expertise in the construction of best practice law enforcement standard operating procedures and training police officers to respond in best practice and trauma-informed ways to victims of sexual assault and intimate partner violence. In her current role, Murray coordinates curriculum development and instruction for national classes, including basic and advanced sexual misconduct investigation classes; an investigation of dating violence, domestic violence and stalking class; and a Title IX Coordinator/Investigator class offered through D. Stafford & Associates. To date, Murray has trained more than 3,500 criminal and civil rights investigators throughout the U.S.

Drawing on her experiences as a trained criminal and civil rights investigator, Murray also oversees independent investigations of complex sexual misconduct cases; conducts audits of Title IX/VAWA Compliance; drafts institutional sexual misconduct policies and procedures; and conducts campus-based trainings pertaining to the resolution of sexual misconduct offenses on college and university campuses. Panelist: Mike Hill, Director of Public Safety, Swarthmore College

Mike Hill is the director of public safety at Swarthmore College, a position he has held since 2012. Prior to Swarthmore, Hill served Bryn Mawr College for more than 20 years in varying public safety positions of increasing responsibility, including director, and ultimately served as director of operations for Bryn Mawr and Haverford Colleges. Drawing on his more than 30 years of private security

and higher education campus safety experience, Hill has also served as an expert witness on campus safety policies and procedures and as a member of campus safety external review teams at colleges and universities around the country.

He is the founder and CEO of All Right Consulting, LLC. Hill earned a B.A. in social science from the University of Pennsylvania and has completed the Cornell University Diversity and Inclusion Certificate Program. Hill is a Certified Protection Professional through the American Society for Industrial Security. He is also certified by the American Crime Prevention Institute for crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED), as well as conducting security assessments. He is also trained in advanced threat assessment through the National Behavior Intervention Team Association. Hill is also an instructor with the Crisis Prevention Institute for Nonviolent Crisis Intervention, ALICE Navigate 360, Active Shooter Response Training and with RAD Systems for women's self-defense.

Hill is currently president of the Campus Security Directors Association of the Delaware Valley. He also serves on the board of the Northeast Colleges and Universities Security Association (NECUSA) and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7650. Hill resides in Philadelphia, PA.

JP Carr is the Clery Compliance Officer at West Chester University, the largest of the 14 universities in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education (PASSHE), a position he has held since August of 2021. In this position, JP manages all aspects of the institution's Clery Act compliance including chairing the institution's Clery Act Compliance Committee, among other duties.

Before working exclusively in Clery Act compliance he was the Compliance and Database Coordinator in the Office of Student Conduct, also at West Chester University. In that position, he was the office's point person for all Clery Act-related issues as well as the office liaison to the Department of Public Safety.

Before entering higher education, JP was the Assistant Family Court Administrator in the Court of Common Pleas for Chester County, Pennsylvania, and before that served for five years as a judicial law Clerk in the civil/criminal division of the Oakland County (Michigan) Circuit Court. JP is a graduate of The Ohio State University and the Thomas M. Cooley School of Law.

Steve is a Certified Threat Manager (CTM), Board Certified Expert in Traumatic Stress (BCETS), and Certified Master Trainer for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security-National Threat Evaluation & Reporting (NTER) program. He is recognized as an expert in the violence prevention and response.

Steve is the Director of Training for the Disaster & Terrorism Branch in the New Jersey Department of Human Services- Division of Mental Health Services, as well as the founder and principal of Behavioral Science Applications LLC, an innovative behavioral risk management consultancy serving a global client base.

Steve served as a Disaster Field Operations Supervisor for FEMA's response to the 9/11 World Trade Center attacks and coordinated onsite psychological services at New Jersey's Anthrax Screening Center.
