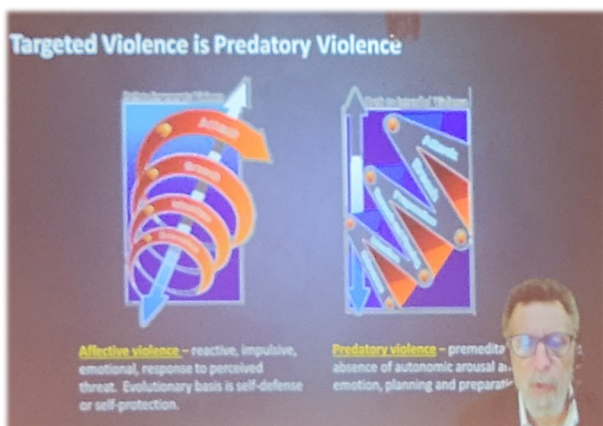

Keynote: Building a Winning Organization

Scott Goodale, Rutgers Wrestling Head Coach

Scott Goodale currently serves as the Head Coach of the Rutgers University Wrestling Team. Since taking over the program 17 years ago, Coach Goodale has become the winningest coach in program history with more than 200 career dual victories "On the Banks".

In 2023-24, Rutgers finished No. 14 in the final NWCA Coaches Poll and produced multiple All-Americans for the eighth time in nine seasons. Eight Scarlet Knights qualified for nationals, the most since all 10 starters qualified in 2016. RU also finished sixth at the 2024 Big Ten Wrestling Championships in College Park, Maryland. Twelve student-athletes earned Winter Academic All-Big Ten recognition, while three individuals were named NWCA Scholar All-Americans.

Under Goodale's watch, RU has two individual national titles, three national finalists, 19 All-Americans, six conference champions (five Big Ten, one EIWA), 102 NCAA Championship qualifiers, 49 Big Ten Conference Championships placewinners and 42 placewinners at the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association (EIWA) Championships and since 2009, have earned two top 10 finishes and 12 top 25 finishes in the final NWCA Division I Coaches Poll. The program has tallied an impressive 221-96-1 dual meet record during his 17 year tenure.

The success of Goodale's teams has resulted in one of the top home environments in the sport. Competing inside Jersey Mike's Arena, the Scarlet Knights have finished within the top 10 in national attendance over the past eight seasons, which includes a 4,002 average in 2023-24. Rutgers drew more than 5,000 fans for three of its matches last season.

Success on the recruiting trail has been a hallmark of Goodale's tenure, as his staff signed the No. 4 overall recruiting class in the country, according to InterMat's final rankings. It marks the highest-rated rookie class under Goodale since he and his staff inked the No. 4 overall class during the 2007-08 cycle.

The Jackson, N.J., native took over the Rutgers program following an impressive seven-year stint as head coach at his alma mater, Jackson Memorial High School. In seven seasons, Goodale compiled an overall record of 155-16, leading his squad to the top ranking in the state in 2006 and 2007.

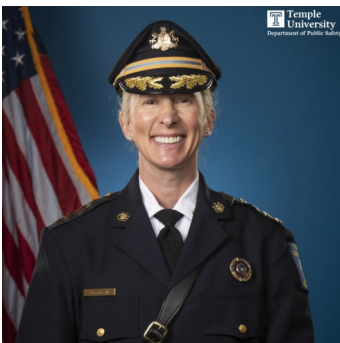

Goodale coached four New Jersey State Champions and five New Jersey State runner-ups, along with 16 additional state placewinners. In total, he has coached a total of 41 District 21 Champions and 10 Region VI Champions. Goodale led his teams to two Group IV State Championships, as well as four Central Jersey Group IV Sectional titles. The legendary Jersey high school wrestling coach was inducted into the South Jersey Wrestling Hall of Fame on Nov. 7, 2009.

On a national level, he spent 12 years as the Junior and Cadet State Team Coach for national wrestling tournaments held in Fargo, N.D. Following the 2005-06 season, he served as the head coach for Team New Jersey at the Junior National Duals.

Goodale wrestled for Lock Haven University in Pennsylvania, earning his bachelor's degree in Health and Physical Education in 1995. He then went to New Jersey City University where he earned a certification in Special Education in 1997. As a collegiate wrestler, Goodale made three trips to the NCAA Championships, as well as placing second at the Eastern Wrestling League (EWL) Tournament twice in his career. During his time with the Bald Eagles, the team was ranked as high as ninth in the country. Goodale finished with 99 wins at Lock Haven.

Chief Jennifer Griffin, Ph.D. Temple

University Police Department

Jennifer D. Griffin, Ph.D. is the Chief and Vice President for the Temple University Department of Public Safety (TUDPS) and the retired Patrol Operations Commander, Creator and Chair of the Employee Wellness Unit, Assistant Commander of the Honor Guard Unit for the Delaware State Police, an Adjunct Professor at the University of Delaware (U.D.), a certified Performance Coach, Yoga Alliance (RYT 200) Yoga Instructor, former Director of Operations for the U.D. Div. 1 Women's Field Hockey Team, and the owner of Strategic Performance Coaching and Consulting, LLC. As Vice President/Chief, she oversees six campuses, with over 30,000 students, 10,000 faculty and staff, over 150 public safety employees, 350 contracted security officers, and a \$32 million dollar budget. Since starting at Temple in August of 2022, Dr. Griffin has completely re-organized the TUDPS utilizing the five pillars of Personnel, Training and Professional Development, Equipment and Technology, Strategy, and Communication and Collaboration. Under her leadership, TUDPS have been

granted over \$2 million in grant funding that has been allocated to increase hiring and retention, technology enhancements and advancements, and increase community collaborations and support within the university and North Philadelphia.

She has over 25 years of law enforcement experience in various assignments and ranks. She has a Doctorate from the University of Delaware Sociology / Criminal Justice Department, with expertise in gender and deviance. She completed a mixed method qualitative and quantitative dissertation titled, *"Are we protecting those who protect us? Stress and Law Enforcement in the 21st Century."* She has been an adjunct professor at the University of Delaware for over a decade, teaching four classes, including CRJU 110-Introductions to Criminal Justice Systems, CRJU 201 Problems of Law Enforcement, CRJU357 Seminar on Policing, and CRJU 367 Criminal Justice Ethics. Vice President Griffin, Ph.D. is a peer-reviewed co-author of a peer-reviewed published article in the American Journal of Criminal Justice titled *"Do Work-family Conflict and Resiliency Mediate Stress and Burnout Among Police Officers"* and a chapter titled *"A Qualitative Study of Police Officer Stress: Sources, Impacts and Supportive Organizational Policies and Programs"* in the "Exploring Contemporary Police Challenges: A Global Perspective" for the Police & Practice Research: An International Journal on Law Enforcement stress, resiliency, work-family conflict, and contemporary initiatives.

She presents and teaches nationally and internationally, including in the United States of America, China, Taiwan, and Canada. She is an F.B.I. National Academy Associates Training Committee member & Comprehensive Officer Resiliency Program Master Instructor, Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement (ABLE) Trainer, and a recognized and contracted Resiliency Subject Matter Expert with the United States Department of Justice Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Collaborative Reform Initiative Technical Assistance Center (CRI-TAC) and the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). She is also a graduate of the prestigious F.B.I. National Academy, Session 268, the United States Secret Service Dignitary Protection Seminar, and the IACP Leadership in Police Organizations (LPO) Program. She has presented numerous times at the IACP Annual Conference, the IACP Officer Safety and Wellness Symposium, the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators (IACLEA) annual conference, and many others. In 2022, Dr. Griffin was an invited presenter by Delaware U.S. Senator Christopher Coons to address the United States Senate Law Enforcement Caucus on proactive initiatives to improve police officers' mental health and resilience.

She is a member of the U.S. Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance and IACP National Consortium on Preventing Law Enforcement Suicide, which is a group of law enforcement, mental health, and suicide prevention, families, and academia, with the common goal of preventing officer suicide. Dr. Griffin is the IACP University/College Police Section Educational Chair and was recently appointed by the IACP President to the IACP Board of Directors. In 2024, she was invited to facilitate an IACLEA roundtable discussion titled "*Policing Mass Demonstrations: A Conversation with Campus Police Leaders*." and present to the IACLEA Leadership Development Institute, on "*Mass Demonstrations and Protests*." In December of 2024, Dr. Griffin was invited to participate in the pilot launch of the IACLEA and Rutgers University, Miller Center on Policing and Community Resilience "*Navigating Through Campus Conflict*," a two-day pilot program aimed at equipping campus law enforcement, security, and administrative officials with the tools to address today's increasingly complex challenges. Due to her participation, she was quoted in a *Police1* article on the program.

Lt. Matthew Johnson has over 17 years of law enforcement experience. Currently serving as the Lieutenant of the Community Outreach and Support Team (COAST) at the University of Maryland, Baltimore Police Department, he has developed and implemented programs that strengthen police-community relationships and address community needs.

Lt. Johnson led the creation of the UMBPD Therapy Dog Program, which became the second university police program of its kind in the nation. The program's success has since inspired similar initiatives at three other University of Maryland schools. He brings extensive knowledge about the benefits of therapy K-9 programs—such as enhancing mental health and building community trust—and has firsthand experience maintaining these programs and overcoming the challenges involved in their implementation.

His work has been recognized by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), which named him one of their 2019 '40 Under 40' leaders. He has also received the Maryland Governor's Award for Crime Prevention and the Baltimore Banner Emerging Leader Award for his contributions to public safety and community engagement.

A United States Marine Corps veteran, Lt. Johnson is committed to advancing public safety strategies that prioritize trust, collaboration, and innovative approaches to policing, fostering long-lasting positive change in the communities he



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Michele Pich is the Assistant Director/Department Head of the Shreiber Family Pet Therapy Program at Rowan University. She has graduate degrees in Psychology, and in Criminal Justice (with her PhD work in the Criminal Justice/Public Health/Trauma domains with her dissertation study of “Conceptions and Applications of Trauma-informed Policing: International Perspectives”), and earned her graduate certificate as a Canine-Assisted Intervention Specialist at the University of Denver. She brings 15 years of experience in professional animal-assisted interventions (including animal-assisted therapy, animal-assisted activities, and animal-assisted education), was a small business owner, has 24 years of professional experience in the mental health field (mental health counselor, veterinary grief counselor, cancer support group facilitator), 14 years of teaching University students (including as faculty at Rowan University since 2014 in the Law & Justice Studies Department and for DEI initiatives, as well as Temple University, and the University of Pennsylvania), 20 years conducting research in legal, mental health, and public health fields. She previously co-directed a therapy animal visitation program at the University of Pennsylvania which partnered to bring visits to the Philadelphia Ronald McDonald House. Michele and her recently retired certified therapy dog, Vivian Peyton have been members of the National Dog Show Therapy Dog Ambassador Team since 2012. And, her certified therapy dog, Ralphie recently joined both the Shreiber Family Pet Therapy Program at Rowan University as a facility dog, and the National Dog Show Therapy Dog Ambassador Team in 2023. Michele is responsible for the development, oversight, and maintenance of the Shreiber Family Pet Therapy Program. As part of this role, she plans and hosts the National Dog Show Therapy Dog Symposium at Rowan University annually in the Fall with her fellow host, David Frei (Host of the National Dog Show & former Host of Westminster Dog Show). 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Detective Sergeant Alvan Flanders is a Detective Sergeant with the Princeton University Department of Public Safety. He is a graduate of the Trenton Police Academy and began his career at Princeton University as a Public Safety Officer in 1995. Following several years as a Police Officer at Princeton, he was appointed to the Detective Bureau in 2005. In this role, Detective Sergeant Flanders was instrumental in establishing the department's processing room, interview room, and crime scene unit and was later promoted to Detective Sergeant.

After serving as a Detective Sergeant for over a decade and working with countless students, faculty, and staff, Detective Sergeant Flanders saw the need for an increased connection between the Department of Public Safety and the campus community. He sought to make the Department more accessible to students, provide support to the community, and be an advocate for mental health and wellness. By 2021, Detective Sergeant Flanders had been approved to establish a *Community Caretaking Canine* program within the Princeton University Department of Public Safety.

Through the organization, Puppies Behind Bars, Detective Sergeant Flanders was matched with Coach, a trained therapy dog that specializes in first responder wellness and community policing. Over the last four years, Coach and Detective Sergeant Flanders have become a fixture on campus, attending student organization meetings, campus sporting events, and connecting with students individually. Through the *Community Caretaking Canine* program, the pair have worked to promote mental health and wellness, bridge the gap between the Department of Public Safety and the students, and spread joy throughout campus.



Corporal April Latona has been a member of the Haledon Police Department for 10 years where she is assigned to the patrol division. Corporal Latona also serves as the department's Humane Law Enforcement Officer. Knowing her passion for animals, Deputy Chief George Guzman approached her with the idea of a Therapy K9 program in late 2023 as they started becoming more popular in law enforcement. Corporal Latona had rescued Nash from Jersey Pits Rescue in June of 2023 and believed he would be the perfect fit for the department. K9 Nash underwent basic and advanced obedience training through Cover K9 Training company and then went on to get his Therapy K9 certification. He also received numerous certifications through the American Kennel Association. K9 Nash was officially sworn into

the Haledon Police Department in March of 2024 and since then the program has been a huge success. We immediately saw the benefits such as enhancing mental health both within the department and Borough as well as within the community and building engagement. K9 Nash has had such a positive impact on the officers and community he truly has become part of the family!



Thriving in High-Stakes Environments: Motivation and Mental Toughness for Law Enforcement

Lloyd Eisler

Lloyd Eisler is an Olympic bronze medalist, world-renowned athlete, and motivational leader with a deep connection to the values of law enforcement and public safety. As the son of a Canadian law enforcement officer, Lloyd grew up with firsthand insight into the courage, discipline, and resilience required to serve and protect communities.

A four-time Olympian and six-time World Championship medalist, Lloyd's career as a pairs figure skater exemplified the power of determination, teamwork, and overcoming adversity. His achievements on the ice, including bronze medals at both the 1992 and 1994 Winter Olympics, earned him a place in both the Canadian Olympic Hall of Fame and the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame. He is the most decorated World Pair Medalist in Canadian figure skating history.

Lloyd's passion for mentoring others led him to coaching, where he has worked with athletes across disciplines, including hockey players. As a highly sought-after hockey coach, he specializes in power skating and edge control, helping players refine their skills and improve their on-ice performance. His coaching expertise has benefited athletes at all levels, from youth players to elite professionals.

As a sought-after speaker, Lloyd shares compelling lessons on motivation, resiliency, and adapting under pressure. Drawing on his personal journey and the values instilled by his law enforcement upbringing, Lloyd inspires public safety professionals to embrace challenges, foster teamwork, and thrive in high-stakes environments. His message resonates with those dedicated to serving and protecting others while maintaining their own well-being and mental toughness.

Catherine Cocks, Director, Student Affairs, Behavioral Threat Assessment and Independent Investigation Services, D Stafford & Associates

Ms. Cocks has been a higher education professional for over thirty years. Her work with D. Stafford & Associates focuses on Title IX investigations and training; assessment of student affairs policies, practices and services; and behavioral threat assessment services. Cathy was the Director of Community Standards for the University of Connecticut for 14 years where she managed the student conduct process, which included managing all Title IX cases involving student respondents and chaired the University's student threat assessment team. Prior to that, she held several positions within Residential Life at the University of Connecticut and Roger Williams University.

She is a faculty member for the Association for Student Conduct Administration's (ASCA) Donald D. Gehring Academy teaching on subjects such as ethics, governance, threat assessment, media relations, and higher education trends. She was an affiliated faculty

member for many years in the University of Connecticut's Higher Education and Student Affairs Master's program teaching "The Law, Ethics, and Decision-Making in Student Affairs."

Cathy has co-authored the "Philosophy of Student Conduct" chapter in the 2nd edition of "Student Conduct Practice" (2020) and was a member of the writing team for CAS Standards' Cross-functional Framework for Identifying and Responding to Behavioral Concerns.

Cathy is a Past President of ASCA. She has also served as a Circuit representative, co-chair of the Public Policy and Legislative Issues Committee, and as a member of the ASCA Expectations of Members Task Force. Cathy has served in a variety of leadership roles in NASPA Region I.

She was the 2015 recipient of ASCA's Donald D. Gehring Award. She is a past recipient of the NASPA Region I Mid-Level Student Affairs Professional Award and the NASPA Region I Continuous Service Award.

She earned her Master's degree in Higher Education Administration from the University of Connecticut and Bachelor's degree in Communications/Media from Fitchburg State University.

Jim Moore III, U.S. Department of Education

**Behavioral Threat Assessment-Early Identification of
Threats on Campus**

Capt. Blaze Pecenak (Ret.), NJ State Police

Blaze M. Pecenak is a twenty-five year veteran of the New Jersey State Police where he attained the rank of Captain and title of Bureau Chief of the Transportation Safety Bureau which lies within the Special Operations Section under the Homeland Security Branch.

Upon graduating from Rutgers University - New Brunswick with degrees in the Administration of Justice, Psychology, and Criminology he enlisted in the Division of State Police. As a general road-duty trooper, he began seeking some of the greatest criminal interdiction minds the nation had to offer. Garnering that knowledge, coupled to his attention to detail, skill at accessing hidden compartments, and the belief that criminals are most vulnerable while in transit, he carved out a niche within the Field Operations Section.

The two-time Trooper of the Year nominee was eventually transferred to a bureau who's mission involved the commercial transportation sector. Upon identifying gaps in the State's mercantile homeland security safety net, he established one of the nation's first stand-alone units focusing on commercial vehicle interdiction, intelligence-gathering, inspection, and instruction. It's genesis resulted in record contraband seizures for the Division, the State of New Jersey, and the nation; some of which still stand today.

A published writer, Blaze is known as a subject matter expert in his field. He has been an adjunct instructor at the New Jersey State Police Academy as well as held the rating of master instructor with the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Motor Carrier, National Training Center. Blaze has taught thousands of law enforcement professionals in North and South America as well as from the Baltic States resulting in countless seizures and program formations combatting the war on drugs, weapons, human trafficking, and terror.

He currently works as a contractor for the State on their Opioid Enforcement Task Force as well as consults for any requesting security or law enforcement entity in need.

**Chief Daran Dodd, University of North
Carolina Asheville**

Daran Dodd is the Chief of Police at the University of North Carolina Asheville, one of the 17 campuses comprising the University of North Carolina System. He has served as a campus police chief in the university and community college setting for over ten years. Some of his prior experience includes serving as a Supervisory Special Agent with the North Carolina Secretary of State, Drug Enforcement Agent with the North Carolina Department of Revenue, and Police Officer with the City of Asheville, North Carolina. He serves in leadership roles with several organizations, including Vice President for the North Carolina Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators, Higher Education Committee Chair for the North Carolina Association of Chiefs of Police, NC Chapter President for the National Association of Campus Safety Administrators, and Vice President for the Blue Ridge Fire and Rescue Board of Directors.

Daran is nearing completion of a Doctor of Education degree in Educational Leadership with research focused on trauma-informed approaches to active assailant training. He holds a Master of Public Affairs degree and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice. He is a graduate of the FBI Command College, NACSA Command College, and recipient of the International Association of Chiefs of Police 40 under 40 award. He holds an NC Advanced Law Enforcement Certification, Criminal Investigation Certification, and NC Certified Law Enforcement Instructor Certification.

Kyle Norton, The Healy + Group

Kyle Norton joins Healy + with an extensive higher education and auditing background. He served as a consultant for large banking corporations, through which he developed process mapping, identified gaps, analyzed risk, audited and re-wrote policies and procedures, and worked with internal stakeholders to re-train employees on best practices. In higher education, Kyle has served as an Assistant Director of Undergraduate Programs and Recruitment through which he led university-wide recruitment initiatives, developed student leadership programs, spearheaded summer camp programs for high school students, and served as a student conduct board hearing member. Kyle also served as a Managing Director and full-time clinical professor, and oversaw the academic advising team, teaching faculty, curriculum development, and strategic growth for his division.
